Abstract

Demonstrates the necessity of the mapic form which is based on the distinction between objects and places. Examins Peter Strawson's famous account of the conditions that are necessary for object identification and re-identification. Shows that there is a close match between the formal aspects of these requirements and our description of the mapic form. The identification of individual physical objects is arguably amongst the most basic of cognitive tasks; the mapic form is necessary even for this. The third argument comes out of information theory. For any representation to be non-vacuous, in informational theoretic terms, we show that it must be encoded in a map-like format: one that encodes all possibilities as a background of the actuality.
